Speaker and Topic: Basics on the I/DD Program with Greg Wintle.

The Home and Community Based Services Intellectual/Developmentally Disabled (I/DD) program serves individuals age five and older who meet the definition of intellectual disability, having a developmental disability or are eligible for care in an Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF-IID).

13000 Kansans eligible for services. 9000 are receiving services. 3200 on the waiting list.

1995 DD Reform Act changed the face of what DD is. Prior to we didn't have CDDO's.

39-1802. Policy of state. It is the policy of this state to assist persons who have a developmental disability to have:

(a) Services and supports which allow persons opportunities of choice to increase their independence and productivity and integration and inclusion into the community;

(b) Access to a range of services and supports appropriate to such persons; and (c) the same dignity and respect as persons who do not have a developmental disability. History: L. 1995, ch. 234, § 2; Jan. 1, 1996.



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CDDOs are the single point of entry in that they do the initial eligibility assessments.

We have about 12 services.

- 1. Residential habilitation.**
- 2. Day supports.**
- 3. Assisted services. Home modification, van modification, wheelchair mods, etc. Medical alert service. Wellness monitoring.**
- 4. Financial Management Services.**
- 5. Personal Assistant Services**
- 6. Sleep Cycle Support**
- 7. Specialized Medical Care**
- 8. Supported Employment**
- 9. Supportive Home Care**
- 10. Overnight Respite Care**
- 11. Wellness Monitoring**
- 12. Self-Directed Services.**

Basis assessment, determines if the person meets minimum to be on the HCBS waiver.

Q. Carol McFadden AM, Residential services, that is for someone NOT living with family?

A. That is correct. We need to talk about that.

Q. Susan Shaw, Group homes- I have an adult daughter that will need to live in a home, alone or with someone nonverbal. This is expensive. If you can't supplement Medicaid money with private money- what to do?

A. Most people will have to share. You need to work well with the MCO and TCM. You don't always succeed the first time in roommates and may have to try several times before you find one that works.



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Q. Percy Turner- I am wondering about the waiting list. Do you have an estimate on how long they have to wait?

A. Right now we are offering services to those waiting since 2008.

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
