
- A Request For Information Process was initiated in February, 2015

Connecting Communities Through Promotion, Education, Awareness, and Advocacy

- **Prevention**--delivered prior to the onset of a disorder, these interventions are intended to prevent or reduce the risk of developing a problem, such as underage alcohol use, prescription drug misuse and abuse, and illicit drug use.
- **Promotion**--these strategies are designed to create environments and conditions that support behavioral health and the ability of individuals to withstand challenges. Promotion strategies also reinforce the entire continuum of behavioral health services.

Connecting Communities Through Promotion, Education, Awareness, and Advocacy

- **Education**--builds skills through structured learning processes. Critical life and social skills include decision making, peer resistance, coping with stress, problem solving, interpersonal communication, and systematic and judgmental capabilities. There is more interaction between facilitators and participants than there is for information dissemination.
- **Advocacy**--protecting and promoting the welfare and rights of consumers, families and concerned others.

School Domain

School Domain involves questions and indicators revolving around school climate issues.

Community Domain

Community Domain is centered around how comfortable a student is with their community.

Peer/Individual Domain

Peer/Individual Domain measures how the student views himself or herself, and the peers they interact with.

Family Domain

Family domain looks at family beliefs around problem behaviors.

Problem Behaviors

Problem Behaviors are questions and indicators revolving around the emotional or interpersonal maladjustment.

Alcohol

Alcohol involves questions and indicators revolving around all types of alcohol, liquor, beer, binge drinking.

Tobacco

Tobacco involves questions and indicators revolving around all types of tobacco such as cigarettes, and smokeless tobacco.

Marijuana

Marijuana involves questions and indicators revolving around the cannabis plant, usually smoked or eaten to induce euphoria.

Prescription Drugs

Prescription Drugs are indicators revolving around drugs such as Xanax, Valium, Ritalin, etc.

Cocaine, LSD and Other Drugs

Cocaine, LSD, and Other Drugs involves questions and indicators revolving around all types of drugs.

Risk Factors

Risk factors provide a necessary focus and structure for prevention.

Protective Factors

Protective factors provide a necessary focus and structure for prevention.





- Specialize in delivering individualized trainings to help parents identify physical and emotional trauma histories and the impact on normal development, re-establishing positive relationships with children and adolescents, managing behaviors with positive behavior supports, negotiating with community and school agencies for quality services and supports.
- Trainings are available to meet parent schedules - offered online, by phone, person to person with coaching to use the training to real situations.

Keys target population

- The Keys for Networking target population are parents whose children have severe emotional behavioral and/or substance abuse disorders.
- Keys parent peer specialists are parents whose children have recent successful experience securing services for their own and others children. Keys staff are proficient in the Keys Targeted Assistance Model—which has demonstrated effectiveness to a) engage caregivers and b) keep children at home with their families and in their neighborhood schools.
